a building for community/school/church use in a shanty area of Kitwe) is discussing with his colleagues whether to use the donation to permanently roof the building with corrugated iron or to patch it temporarily with plastic, employ two part time teachers for a year and buy furniture, school equipment, and a sewing machine to teach local women skills in tailoring, to create items to sell for school funds and income for the women.
